Why Chai?

Our family came to the United States in 1979 from the Soviet Union, a country which not only abolished religious observance, but also persecuted Jews systematically. Consequently, our introduction to Judaism wasn't rooted in family traditions, but rather in education over time. How we identify today with our Jewish heritage and history is an evolution over 41 years, a series of conscious choices to weave Jewish ideals into our everyday lives. When we moved to the area



in 2011, we wanted to join a congregation that would further our lifelong spiritual journey, where we could build our own traditions. Since then, Temple Chai has continued to provide our family with meaningful support in so many ways, affording us a sense of belonging that was always missing. We are so very grateful to be a part of this amazing community.

A New Approach for a New Year



It started with emails asking people to refrain from hugging and shaking hands. We then had conversations about whether or not we should serve food at events. Soon afterward, we began to map out how we would create more distance between chairs in the sanctuary. Finally, the leadership team, guided by President Jeff Cohodes, Building and Security Chair Jim Elliot, and Executive Director Alison Siegel Lewin, made the decision to suspend all in-person activities. We were disappointed when we realized that this meant we had to figure out how to do Passover while sheltering-in-place. Yet, we put our heads together and we opened our hearts to new possibilities. In the end, we did it. We held our first-ever Temple Chai Digital Seder, and it was wonderful. While we celebrated that experience, we also remarked how much we were looking forward to (hopefully) getting back into the building in a few weeks or months so that we could move onto planning our High Holy Day experience as we customarily do.

Clearly, this was not the case.

As you know, our primary guiding principle as we determine how to operate in this COVID-19 Era is Pikuach Nefesh: preserving life. Yes, we want desperately to gather in our gorgeous sanctuary so that we can see each other, greet each other, pray with one another, and sing together. Nonetheless, we know that there are too many risks involved. We care too much about our

congregation and our members to do anything that might bring on unnecessary spread of the virus.

Once it was evident to our leadership team that High Holy Days would most likely not take place in person, we immediately began thinking about how we could create and facilitate a meaningful experience from afar. Many of us signed up for webinars and workshops. I accepted several invitations to participate in various rabbinic think tanks. We entered into conversations with many of you so that we could understand what the High Holy Days mean to our congregation in general, and what we need from them this year.

Understanding the limitations and constraints of not being in a physical world, but also embracing the opportunities and flexibility that the digital world provides, our leadership team has put together a robust High Holy Day extravaganza. Rather than thinking about these sacred days as opportunities to participate in services, we have expanded the season so that our congregation can participate in experiences that include, but also go beyond, liturgical moments.

As you will see in the pages of this ChaiLites edition, we are providing ways for you to connect with the holidays, with each other, and with the divine through a variety of platforms. We will have several activities in Elul, which is the month preceding Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, including

workshops to help you bring the High Holy Day feeling into your homes and a very special S'lichot program that will enable us to prepare our minds and souls for the Ten Days of Awe (the period of Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur). In addition, there will be limited opportunities for you to schedule a personal visit to our sanctuary so that you can spend a few quiet moments in front of the ark if you so desire.

On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we will join by Zoom for services, led by myself, Cantor Simon, and Rabbi Hart from the Temple Chai building. We will also offer several "retreat" experiences throughout the days. For the first time ever, we will celebrate a Rosh Hashanah Seder in the afternoon, and will convene a digital break-fast at the conclusion of Yom Kippur. Furthermore, we will have "on-demand" videos that you will be able to access throughout the Holy Days so that you can have supplemental touchpoints during these sacred occasions.

As I hope you can sense, while we are disappointed that we cannot be together in person, we are excited to launch these special services, programs, and initiatives that strive to capture the essence of this season: reflection, renewal, connection, community tradition, healing, and hope.

I look forward, as always, to sharing this special time with you.





Unique High Holy Day Traditions You Can Witness in Israel

WOW!!!!! Look at that guy spinning a live chicken over the heads of those young children. What is happening? Wait, it must be the day before Yom Kippur. This ritual is known as Kapparot but watch out for the animal rights organizations.

Our Temple Chai multigenerational journeys to Israel have given us great insight into the unique habits and lifestyles of the Chanukah traditions and the amazing Shabbat experiences in Jerusalem. With the complex tapestry of life in Israel there are many unique Jewish High Holiday traditions whether it be the country's secular, Reform, religious Zionists or ultra-Orthodox. Here are just a few you may witness strolling the streets of Tel Aviv, Jerusalem, and other Israeli communities.

• The appearance of Pomegranates; Midrash says they contain 613 seeds representing one for each of the 613 Mitzvot (Commandments)

- On Rosh Hashanah, you can try a traditional dish, the head of a fish, symbolizing the "head" of the year.
- Generally on the first day of Rosh HaShanah you'll find people gathering around large bodies of water, certainly not feeding the fish, but performing the atonement ritual of Tashlich. (Hebrew for "cast off").
- The whole country comes to a sudden halt for Yom Kippur. Cars stop driving, the stores and restaurants close down and an incredible stillness surrounds the country. By law, all businesses, services, public transportation are suspended and all vehicles stay off the road as traditionally honored by the whole Jewish community.
- The amazing Sukkot of Jerusalem! Building and living in temporary booths (that's the meaning of the word Sukkot) and Jerusalem is one of the best places to see how many variations and interpretations of a "booth" people can come up with.

"Elul is the Hebrew month that precedes the High Holidays (Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur).

Some say that the Hebrew letters that comprise the word Elul – aleph, lamed, vav, lamed – are an acronym for "Ani l'dodi v'dodi li," a verse from Song of Songs that means "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." Most often interpreted as love poetry between two people, the phrase also reflects the love between God and the Jewish people, especially at this season, as we assess our actions and behaviors during the past year and hope for blessings in the coming year.

Several customs during the month of Elul are designed to remind us of the liturgical season and help us prepare ourselves and our souls for the upcoming High Holidays including: blowing the shofar, saying special prayers, visiting loved ones' graves, reading Psalm 27, and taking time to reflect." Even in this changed world, we can still create the sense of the Yamim Noraim (Days of Awe) by doing the little things that are integral to this season. Below are Rabbi Baden's Top Ten Tips for creating a High Holy Day ambience in your home.



Get dressed for the service.



Wear your tallit and/ or kippah if that is your practice.



Participate in the Zoom service from a different room or space in your home than you normally use.



Bring in or have flowers delivered to your home to make that room feel more special.



Turn off your phones so as not to be distracted.



Use the chat feature on Zoom to say Amen.



Sound your own shofar during the services. (or early in the morning to wake up your kids!)



Follow along in your Mishkan HaNefesh prayer books. If you don't have the set, be sure to order them from Amazon Smile. Remember to choose Temple Chai as your donation destination.



Play recordings of the High Holy Day melodies throughout the day.



Call or email your Temple Chai friends whom you would normally greet in the building to wish them a L'shanah Tovah.

APPLE PANCAKE

Submitted to the Spice of Chai book by Sheryl Rosen

Batter:

½ c. milk

½ c. flour

3 eggs

1 tsp. sugar

Toppings:

½ c. light brown sugar

3 to 5 tart apples, sliced thin

2 tsp. cinnamon

5 T. butter

Brown tart apples in butter with a little bit of the topping.

Batter: Mix batter until smooth (use blender). Put apples and butter into pie plate. Pour batter over apples. Bake at 500 degrees for six to seven minutes, then sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Bake another eight minutes. Bake on second shelf of oven.



CHOCOLATE CHIP APPLESAUCE CAKE

Submitted to the Spice of Chai book by Barbara Rosenberg

1 c. butter (margarine)

2 c. sugar

4 eggs

3 ½ c. flour

2 tsp. baking soda

½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. cloves

1 tsp. allspice

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 ½ c. applesauce

1 c. chopped nuts

2 c. chocolate chips

1 c. raisins (opt.)

Cream butter. Add sugar gradually, ream until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Sift together dry ingredients. Add alternately with applesauce. Stir in nuts, chocolate chips, and raisins. Pour into 2 loaf pans lined with paper. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes at 325 degrees. Cool on rack after removing from pans.



Kids Corner Recipe **HONEY CAKE**

Submitted to the Spice of Chai book by Brandon Stec

2 eggs

3/4 c. honey

1 c. sugar

½ c. + 1 T. oil

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. cocoa

1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 c. nuts (opt.)

1 c. strong coffee

2 c. flour

Beat all together for 5 minutes. Pour into 8 ½ x 12 – inch loaf or tube pan. Bake at 375 degrees for about 45 minutes, or until done.



Saturday, September 12

S'lichot, more than any other moment in the Jewish calendar signifies the High Holidays are near. Typically, S'lichot occurs at the close of Shabbat just prior to Rosh HaShanah. The word "s'lichot" means "forgiveness" At Temple Chai, we observe S'lichot with a program and service.

Shabbat Shuvah

Friday, September 25 - 26

Shabbat Shuvah is known as the "Sabbath of Repentance" and is the Shabbat between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Ki-ppur. This Shabbat gets its name from the Haftarah portion that begins with the verse from Hosea: Shuvah Yisrael, "Return, O Israel." In Hebrew, Shuvah (return) and Teshuvah (repentance) share the same root.

Saturday, September 26 11:30 a.m.

"Casting away;" A traditional ceremony during the High Holy Day season in which which individuals symbolically "cast away" their sins or wrongdoings from the past year by throwing breadcrumbs into a flowing body of water. It is our custom at Temple Chai to do this during the Saturday of Shabbat Shuvah.
