

Chidush



One of Judaism's greatest assets is its grounding in tradition. It is powerful to know that the liturgy we pray, the holidays we observe, and the rituals we practice link us to countless generations—both past and future. At the same time, another huge strength of our faith is innovation. We are encouraged by our religion to find personal meaning and contemporary insight within our personal practice. Indeed, Judaism is a living and breathing organism that has adapted, and will continue to adapt, to the ever-changing nature of life.

Chidush is the Hebrew term that melds these two characteristics together. Chidush is about discovering something new in something old. While this term is traditionally used in the context of text study, it can be applied to every aspect of Judaism, including our involvement with Temple Chai—especially as we anticipate welcoming the new Jewish Year of 5780.

Temple Chai is fortunate to have such a solid history. We are proud that there are some members who are the third or fourth generation of their families who have belonged to our congregation. Yet, Temple Chai is also a synagogue that prides itself on finding new and innovative ways to engage us in Jewish life. While we are grateful for the traditions, we are also open to experiencing new approaches so that we can be enriched by our involvement.

One example of chidush at Temple Chai is this edition of the ChaiLites. While producing a newsletter is familiar, both our congregation and how we communicate have changed, and we needed to adapt our congregational publication to meet those changes. We hope you enjoy this new format, the new content included, and we hope that it can serve as an inspiration for all of us to infuse our own sense of originality into those acts and rituals that keep us connected to the past.



The number of tickets received is based upon the number of adults listed in your Temple membership. For example, a "Standard 1 Adult" membership entitles you to one ticket for the holidays while a "Senior 2 Adult" membership entitles you to two. As always, youth up to age 29 are included in their parents' or guardians' membership.

New This Year, Temple Chai will not be requiring tickets of attendees up to 29 years of age—young adults may be asked to show proof of age in lieu of a ticket.

Members may purchase additional tickets for the High Holy Days by contacting the Temple Chai office NO LATER THAN September 15, 2019.

Congregational Learning



You probably know more Hebrew than you realize. Even if you didn't attend Hebrew school yourself, there are Hebrew words that are used regularly in our Jewish Life Vocabulary!

New this year, we are implementing elements of a new Hebrew Curriculum called #OnwardHebrew. One element of this program is deliberate use of Jewish Life Vocabulary. Each week we will focus on words that begin with the same Hebrew letter. Sometimes they may also be connected to a holiday or celebration. The goal is to infuse more Hebrew into our vocabulary and deepen our understanding of our Jewish Life Vocabulary. Many words are likely already familiar, but we will be connecting them in new ways and integrating them throughout the congregation in intentional ways.

For example, you might be familiar with the phrase Mazel Tov. Mazel literally means "luck or fortune" and Tov means "good". So, when we put them together, we get "good fortune" or "congratulations". Tov

is a word we use in other familiar phrases through too: Boker Tov (good morning), Erev Tov (good evening), Shana Tovah (good year or happy new year) or even on its own Tov (as in good job!).

Why so much explanation? Well, exploring Hebrew words we might already be familiar with as part of our Jewish Life Vocabulary we are able to gain a deeper understanding of our Jewish life. Through just looking at the word *Tov* we can delve deeper into time, our Jewish calendar, even how to support one another within a Jewish context.

Each week our Jewish Life Vocabulary will be visible and integrated throughout the school in every class and even make its way into *T'fillah* (services – see what I did there?) and Shabbat worship too! Tov M'od really good!

Humans of Temple Chai: Beverly and Julian Schreiber

Ask Julian Schreiber what springs to mind when he thinks of Temple Chai and he will tell you without hesitation, "the volunteer spirit of this congregation." Arlington Heights residents Julian and Beverly Schreiber have been members of Temple Chai for 47 years. "The Jewish population in the Northwest suburbs was increasing in leaps and bounds back in the 70's," said Julian. "Beverly and I thought it was important to join an engaged and growing reform congregation." The

Schreiber's, along with their two young children, were part of the second wave of members to call Temple Chai home shortly after opening its doors in 1972. "There was no Checker Road building as we know it today. That didn't happen until 1980," Julian explained. "In 1972 Shabbat services were held at Kilmer School in Buffalo Grove, then they moved us to a small church in Wheeling before renting space again in BG at Kingswood United Methodist Church."

Both Julian and Beverly jumped in and got involved. Beverly served as the second Sisterhood President and she helped start the first library as well as gift shop. "I drove around with the gift shop in the trunk of my car," she said with a laugh. Julian was one of the first board members, later serving as the first religious school principal and elected President of the Board of Directors in 1982.

Julian was also very involved in launching several Temple Chai theatrical productions back in the 80's and both of them have worked hard in recent years to publicize the many programs and events Temple Chai offers. Neither will take much credit. "It was largely the unsung members of our extraordinary committees that kept our temple vibrant and flourishing," said Julian. "We were a DIY (do it yourself) temple and our committees and dedicated members did

it all—laid sod in our temple yard, painted when needed and installed the parking lot lights."

Added Beverly, "our network of friends wanted the temple to succeed so we coordinated our efforts. We baked our own oneg desserts for Friday night and I even mopped the temple floor if it was dirty. We did not have Jaime or Gabby working for us, yet. We got stuff done."

A retired employment law attorney, today Iulian volunteers his time at a school for special education students, helping the kids to read and introducing them to theatre.

Julian's only regret is that he still hasn't realized his dream to be a major league baseball player.

Beverly stays active with the Women of Temple Chai and has now become proficient at following the stock market, buying and selling stocks for their family portfolio.

(Editorial comment: Lots has changed in the 47 years the Schreiber's have been members. Our volunteers may not be mopping floors or installing parking lot lights, but our Temple still depends on the dedicated efforts of so many congregants. We thank the Schreibers for leading the way.)

Temple Chai at the Buffalo Grove Pride Parade



You may have noticed a new sign on the doors into the building. It's a small white sticker with a bright rainbow that says "Temple Chai - Everyone Is Welcome Here!" A simple statement with a powerful message. While we might have known that everyone is welcome here, for an LGTBQ+ identifying person, its important to know that Temple Chai is a safe space and that they are welcome in our community.

We created this sign among other things because of a yearlong workshop we've participated in through Keshet, a national organization working towards LGBTQ+ equality in Jewish Life. Serendipitously, our work on inclusion coincided with the first ever Buffalo Grove Pride Parade this past June. Over 35 temple members marched together in the parade, joined by many more watching the parade too. We were right at the beginning, number 7 of 89 groups that marched. The energy and positivity were electric and contagious!! Over 5,000

people participated in the celebration focused on love and acceptance of LGBTQ+ folks in our community!

Personally, this was the first time I had ever marched in a parade before. It was so special to march with my family and my extended Temple Chai family and proudly put our Jewish Values into action. I believe that we are ALL created B'tzelem Elohim in the image of God, and therefore ALL deserve to live with dignity and equality. I believe our Jewish Community should be a place where every person should feel safe, accepted and comfortable to be themselves. The Buffalo Grove Pride Parade exemplified these values and created a space to truly celebrate them! My kids called it a "rainbow explosion" and keep referring to it as the (Love is) Love Parade. I couldn't have said it any better!





Hineini— Caring for Our Community

In the spirit of *Hineini* — "I am here," Temple Chai members strive to care for one another. We are fortunate to have the leadership of a dedicated committee, Caring Community, leading these efforts.

The following are examples of Temple Chai Members Caring for Members.

- When a congregant becomes a parent or a grandparent, a sweet treat is delivered. We also connect with JUF to have a ¡Baby Swag package delivered to the new parents if they reside in Illinois!

Excerpt from Spice of Chai a Temple Chai Cookbook

Food is embedded in the very foundation of Judaism. It's part of our religious identity and plays an essential role in bringing our families and friends together. Whether it be holidays or life cycle events, the prevalence or absence of food is a theological statement: for example, the round shaped challah symbolizes the kingship of God, oily latkes remind us of the miracle of light, and matzah recalls our exodus out of Egypt. No denying it, the smell of brisket, chicken soup, kugel, and rugelach permeating a Jewish home has helped ensure our very survival while fueling our neurotic obsession with food.

We call ourselves the people of the book, but perhaps we should call ourselves the people of the table. In the kitchen noshing or at the table eating, this is where Judaism is experienced, argued, smelled, and tasted. So enjoy and be careful with that schmaltz!



HONEY ZUCCHINI BREAD

Written by Claire Lombardo (mother of Michele Fenton)

½ cup flour

½ tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. salt

½ tbsp ground cinnamon

½ cup coarsely ground nuts (walnuts or pecan)

1 large zucchini

(enough for 2 cups shredded)

1 egg

34 cup honey

½ cup vegetable oil

1 tsp. vanilla

Combine the first 5 ingredients. Stir in nuts. Mix zucchini with remaining ingredients; add to the flour mixture, stirring only until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon batter into a greased and floured 5x9x3 inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour, or until bread tests done. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling. If you find it too sweet, try less honey.



LUCHEN KUGEL WITH APPLES

6 eggs, or egg substitute

1 stick butter or margarin, melted

1 lb noodles

1 (15 to 16 oz.) container cottage cheese

½ pint sour cream

1 pint applesauce

or 1 can apple pie filling

Cook noodles according to package directions. Rinse and drain. Mix together remaining ingredients (except apple pie filling if used). Pour over noodles and mix well. Add in apple pie filling now. It blends better when added directly to the noodles. Divide mixture into 2 (8x8 inch) pans or 1 (9x13 inch) pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes or until knife inserted in the middle comes out clean. Note: You can add more cottage cheese or sour cream, to taste. Works equally well with low-fat/no-fat products as with regular ones!






