
In Judaism, we embrace the concept of "Tikkun", which is the Hebrew word for "making things right". Perhaps you are

Shalom,

It is just before Hanukkah as I write this. The BBC is broadcasting Prince Charles, eulogizing Rabbi Jonathan Sacks at his memorial service at the end of his thirty-day shloshim. The prince is rightly proclaiming the esteemed Knight, Lord and emeritus chief rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the British Commonwealth "a light unto the nations." The voice of Rabbi Sacks, the teacher, statesman and world-renowned moralist, was a powerful foil that passionately condemned

negative and politicized extremism, as he strove to repair and illuminate the world with Jewish thought and wisdom. I remember reading a quote from a Sabbath sermon that he, the author of over twenty books, shared on the theme of prayer and music about ten years ago.

"Judaism is a religion of words, and yet whenever the language of Judaism aspires to the spiritual it breaks into song, as if the words themselves sought escape from the gravitational pull of finite meanings. There is something about music that intimates a reality beyond our grasp. Words are the language of the mind. Music is the language of the soul... The Torah is God's libretto, and we, the Jewish people, are God's choir, the performers of God's choral symphony. Indeed, it is our choirs and the music they generate that help create many of our most uplifting and highly spiritual moments."

However unique the language of a faith maybe, Rabbi Sack's words regard the universal power of music in all faiths, and I think for each of us personally as well. While all may not love choral music specifically, something happens to us when God language is set to music and harmony that opens another part of us and unlocks a gateway to holiness; with the power to repair our souls, transcend our fears and connect with a universal love of "the other" that lifts us beyond all specific creed or dogma, filling us with unbounded hope.

In the new year and coming months please turn to Temple Chai and join your clergy team and volunteers to fix this injured world with song. We will share our favorite inspiring music and encourage you to do the same. Like it does at all of our Holy Days and celebrations, Jewish spiritual music has the power, right now, to unify us and be a balm to us all. Let's harness the power of spiritual music to lift us up and beyond the loss, sadness and brokenness we have all been experiencing and feeling. We are here for you, all in, bursting to share "the language of the soul" in poignant services and communal opportunities; repairing the world with music both glorious and intimate.

Using Israeli Innovation To Repair Our World

Tikkun Olam (Repair the World) is a Jewish value that the State of Israel and its citizens embody in a plethora of initiatives that make positive impacts both domestically and internationally. On December 6, Temple Chai had the pleasure of hearing from Avi Jorisch, the author of Thou Shalt Innovate. We are grateful to the Israel Consulate for helping us sponsor this program, which taught us more about Israel's benevolent use of its technology and expertise.

While most of us are informed about the innovations that Israel contributes to the world of medicine and technology (like developing the next great vaccine or microchip), we hear little about Israel's innovations being used to improve the daily lives of those living in less developed corners of the earth.

Little do we hear about Israel's innovations being used to improving the daily lives of those living in less developed corners of the Earth. In particular Israel has assisted a number of African countries with innovations



focused on battling starvation, providing fresh water, and even harnessing electricity.

Innovate Africa (iA), a private organization based in Israel, focuses on two types of projects. The first is expertise in well-drilling. iA brings a team of engineers and volunteers along with well drills, pumps, piping, and water tower building and technology to monitor the system from Israel once the project is complete. The second type of project is installing, and maintaining of solar powercapabilities that are used for hospitals, schools, and other vital community resources. To date Innovate Africa (innoAfrica.org) has helped to improve the daily lives of over 2 million people in 10 African countries.

In addition to non-governmental organizations, the Israeli government also takes on a *Tikkun Olam* mindset in Africa. Currently, Israel has a team in Ethiopia battling the Desert Locust at the request of the Ethiopian government. The rare locust swarm that Ethiopia now faces threatens to destroy thousands of acres of crops in a country that already battles hunger in a large segment of their population. The Israeli team brings expertise in controlling the locusts while using the least amount of pesticides possible.

We look forward to continuing to explore this kind of amazing work.



Behind the Scenes



People often ask me what goes on behind the scenes at Temple Chai. The answer, invariably, is a lot! As this issue of the ChaiLites turns its focus to Tikkun, to repair, I would like to share with you a number of repairs and upgrades that have been completed recently. Even as our congregational life pivoted to the digital world, our facility has been well cared for. Under the guidance of the Facilities and Security Committee and the Board of Trustees, the Temple Chai team has been hard at work making sure that the facility to which we (hopefully soon) return is one of health, holiness, and hospitality. Please enjoy this peek behind the scenes at just some of the projects undertaken to optimize our congregational home during these many months.

- 1. A COVID Response policy was adopted by the Board of Trustees, based on best practices and review of other religious organization practices. This has been the governing document of how we mitigate potential spread of the virus by making changes to our facility and how we use it.
- 2. Our Building Manager has remained on site during business hours, completing both routine and special projects while the majority of our professional staff has been remote unless necessary.
- 3. We adopted enhanced cleaning and sanitation protocols and obtained the equipment necessary for their implementation.
- 4. Our washrooms are now a nearly touch-free environment due in large part to the hard work of our building and maintenance staff, who spent the summer researching, pricing, and installing everything from motion-controlled door openers to touchless faucets and flushers.
- 5. Hand sanitizer stations were created throughout the building, and COVID screening procedures were put in place for all individuals entering our facility.
- 6. Planned upgrades to our access control, alarm, and monitoring systems were completed as a part of our security improvements under a grant from the Department of Homeland Security.

- 7. Outdoor classrooms were created to allow open-air small group religious school classes to take place in the fall.
- 8. Cost saving and performance enhancing transitions to new phone and IT providers, as well as much needed upgrades to the relevant infrastructure, were completed prior to the High Holy Days.
- 9. Live-streaming stations have been set up throughout the building to enable our clergy and musicians to lead the congregation in worship and conduct life cycle events while remaining physically distant.
- 10. As I write this, additional building upgrades are planned for the early months of 2021.

None of this would have been possible without the generosity of the donors who sponsored these projects and the expertise and dedication of Board members Jim Elliot and Bruce Levine, Building Manager Jaime Marquez, and Assistant Director Scott Goode. Thank you all for your partnership. I look forward to the day when we again congregate in our beautiful facility at 1670 Checker Rd. Until then, I look forward to seeing your smiles on Zoom.

Like so many of us, the Brotine family is living the quarantine life. For them, that means walkie-talkies at the ready and a challah in the oven. But more on that in a bit.

The Brotines; Barry, Maryam, Jacob, age 8, and Riley, age 4, make their home in Palatine. They made Temple Chai their "Jewish home" following an open house where, according to Maryam, they were impressed by the warmth and friendliness of the clergy and members.

Barry grew up on the North Shore, attended Evanston High School, the University of Illinois and received his law degree from Kent College of Law. Maryam was born in the Chicago area before the family moved downstate to Champaign. Her family is Persian, and she was raised in the Islamic faith.

"We were not particularly religious," she says. "I never attended Islamic schools: in fact, I attended Catholic kindergarten. We always had a tree at Christmas as my parents were intent on Westernizing us."

Maryam and Barry met in Chicago while she studied law at DePaul University. Before marrying Barry in 2006, Maryam began Jewish conversion classes. When she broke the news to her dad about converting to Judaism he was completely comfortable with it.

"My dad knew that Barry was a mensch and thought it more important that I marry a good person than worry about religion," Maryam says. "Judaism was so appealing to me. I love the focus on family and home. It was an easy decision."

Fully embracing her Judaism, Maryam has become a weekly challah baker.

"I took lessons from Laura Perpinyal on Zoom and now I'm hooked," she says.

Both Barry and Maryam work from home. She is a lawver for the Illinois Association of School Boards and he with Chicago Title and Trust. Jacob is in third grade studying remotely, and Riley attends pre-school. Both kids are in Sunday School and enjoying their new-found temple friends and activities.

Work-home life can be challenging, but manageable. "Barry does most of the cooking", Maryam explained, and he also drives Riley to school while I help Jacob with his e-learning.

"My home office is upstairs, Jacob is downstairs," she says, "and when he needs me he calls me on a walkie-talkie. It's a great system!"

Since joining TC in 2019, Maryam has jumped into temple life, co-chairing the Book Club and working on social action projects for the Women of Temple Chai.

The family regularly attends Friday night Shabbat services.

"We love the Zoom services, they are a soothing balm in these difficult times, "Maryam says. "Temple Chai has become my Jewish home away from home."

Tu B'shevat Seder

When you hear the word Seder – what Jewish holiday do you think of? I bet it's not Tu B'shevat, but it should be!

Tu B'shevat is a Jewish holiday occurring on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. It is also called Rosh HaShanah La'Ilanot, literally 'New Year of the Trees'. Jewish kabbalists (mystics) in the 16th and 17th centuries created a special ritual to mark the holiday, modeled after the Passover seder, which celebrated God's presence in the natural world.

The Hebrew word Seder means "order" and is what we call any holiday meal that has a specific set of foods, blessings, and readings. Seders exist for many of the Jewish holidays including Passover, Tu B'shevat, and Rosh HaShanah.

What you will need:

WHITE AND RED GRAPE **JUICE OR WINE**

(ENOUGH FOR FOUR SMALL GLASSES PER PERSON)

A Tu B'shevat seder, full of imagery and symbolism, is often divided into four sections that represent the four seasons. As with the Passover seder, the Tu B'shevat seder evolved to include four cups of wine or grape juice, but in varying shades of red, which represent the seasons: white for the bleak time of winter, white with a bit of red to represent the earth's awakening in early spring, red with a bit of white representing the blossoming of late spring, and dark red to represent the fullness of all the growing plants and vegetation along with the heat of summer.

TASTINGS OF THREE **CATEGORIES OF FRUITS OR NUTS**

- 1. Those with an inedible outer covering and edible inside: melons, nuts, pomegranates, coconuts, citrus, bananas, etc.
- 2. Those with an edible outside but inedible pit inside: dates, olives, plums, peaches, apples, avocados, nectarines, pears, etc.
- 3. Those that are entirely edible: berries, figs, grapes, etc.

These categories are said to represent different seasons. There is a lot of material available to add to your seder. Many people will add readings, poems, quotes, pictures about the environment, nature, and trees, or make theirs an Israel-focused seder.

Spice of Chai

Purim is a holiday unlike any other in the Jewish calendar. Crazy costumes, groggers, booing and cheering during the service, fun food and merriment, spiels (Cantor Simon's are a cut above the rest!) mishloach manot (food baskets for friends and family) and so much more. As with any Jewish holiday, food and drink play an important part, both as symbolism and part of the rituals. It is customary for adults to have alcoholic beverages, and the hamentaschen are so delicious (what's your favorite filling? Not poppy seed...anything but poppy seed!). For those unfamiliar with this famous Purim pastry, Hamantaschen (Yiddish for Haman's pockets) are three-cornered pastries filled with poppy seeds (mohn in Yiddish), fruit preserves, chocolate, or other ingredients that are traditionally eaten on Purim. In Israel during the weeks leading up to Purim, the aroma of freshly baked hamantaschen can be smelled on every block. Their triangular shape is thought to be be reminiscent of Haman's hat or ears.



MARGARITA COCKTAIL

1 (1 ½ oz) jigger tequila ½ oz. triple sec 1 oz. fresh lime or lemon juice salt cracked ice

Moisten rim of cocktail glass with fruit rind; spin rim in salt. Shake ingredients with cracked ice. Strain into glass. Sip over salted rim.



SPINACH-CHEESE **TRIANGLES**

Recipe provided by Norma Kaplan

1 (12 oz.) pkg. frozen, chopped spinach 1 ½ c. cheddar cheese, grated 1/4 c. Parmesan cheese, grated 1/3 c. mayonnaise ½ tsp. onion salt 1/8 tsp. garlic powder Dash of white pepper

Dash of nutmeg 1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen puff pastry shells

Cook spinach as package directs. Drain, pressing out as much liquid as possible. Cool. In medium bowl, mix spinach with cheeses, mayonnaise, onion salt, garlic powder, pepper, and nutmeg; set aside. Roll each pastry shell into an 8-inch rectangle and cut each into quarters. Spread with filling. Moisten edges of pastry with water and fold over to enclose filling; form a triangle. Press firmly together with fork and place onto baking sheet. Bake at 400° for about 10 minutes, until puffed and golden brown. Serve warm. Makes 24 servings.



HOMEMADE HAMENTASHENS

²/₃ c. margarine

3 eggs

½ tsp. salt

1 c. flour

1 c. sugar

2 T. melted honey

1 heaping tsp. baking powder

1 can filling (your choice!)

Blend margarine and sugar. Add eggs. Mix. Add honey, salt, baking powder and flour. Mix well. Roll out dough. Cut into 2 1/2-inch circles. Put a dollop of filling in center. Pull up sides to form a triangle. Bake at 400° for 12 to 15 minutes.


