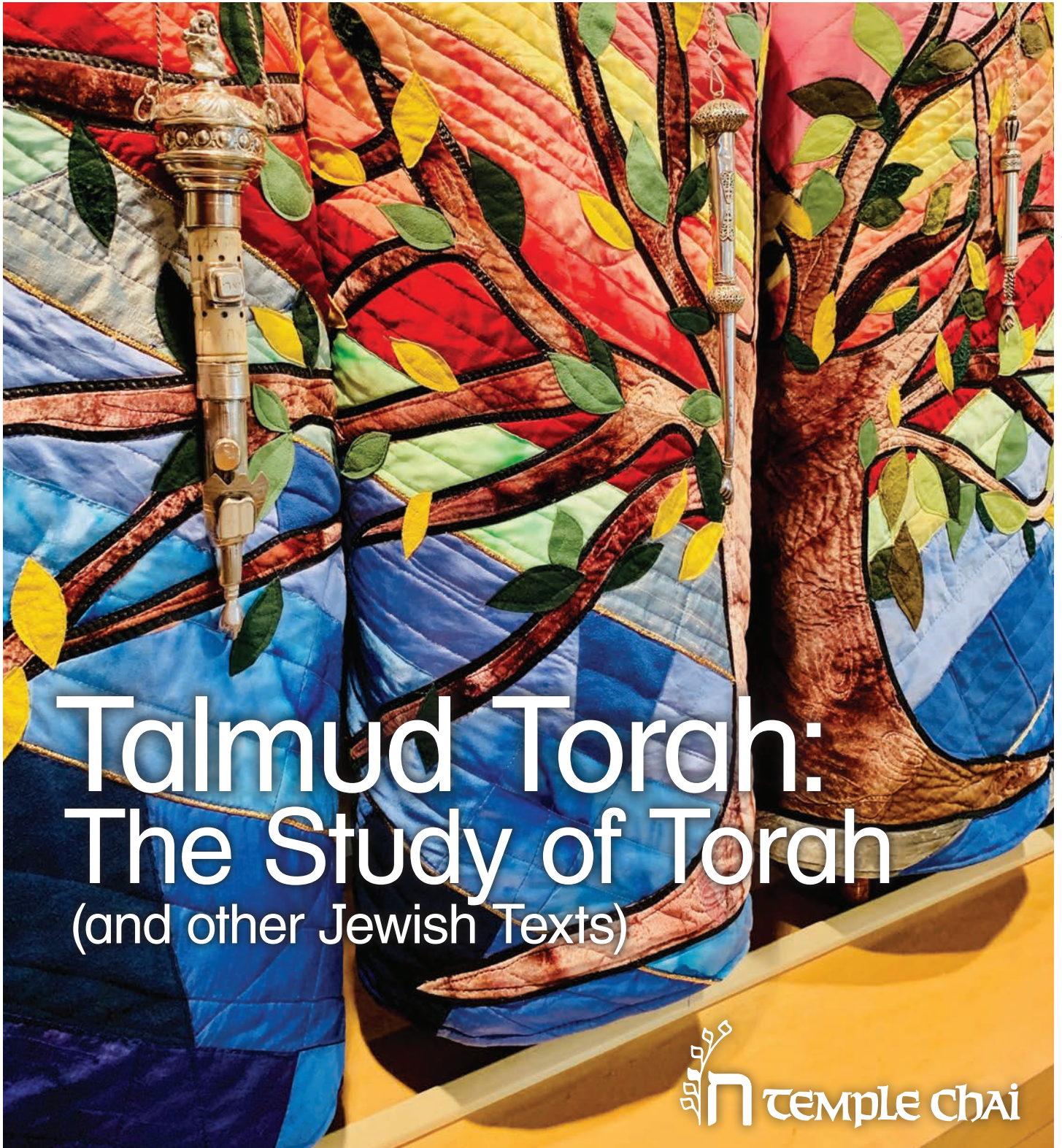

Why Chai?

Brad and I joined Temple Chai many years ago, wanting to provide a Jewish home for our kids. We were initially attracted to the warmth and accessibility of the clergy and the strength of the school. We've stayed, however, because it is now our community; it is our home away from home, filled with those we are proud to call our friends.

Talmud Torah: The Study of Torah (and other Jewish Texts)



There is a beautiful prayer in our morning liturgy that reads: *Eilu d'varim sh'ein lahem shiur...* “These are the obligations without measure, whose reward, too, is without measure...” The liturgy then lists nine *mitzvot* (sacred obligations) that our ancient rabbis deemed especially important, including honoring our parents, engaging

in deeds of compassion, and making peace among people. The prayer concludes with a tenth *mitzvah*, as well as with an important observation: *V'talmud Torah k'neged kulam*. “And the study of Torah encompasses them all.” In some prayer books, the English translation adds the rationale to this final statement: “... because it leads to them all.”

Indeed, study is regarded as a paramount value in our tradition. Judaism understands that growing in knowledge can lead to attaining more wisdom, which will move us and guide us to live lives of honor, compassion, and meaning. One of the names used for the Jewish community in history is “The People of the Book”. Perhaps a more apt name would be “The People of the Books”—for we are the beneficiaries, guardians, and students of a treasure trove of Jewish literary gems.

Our Bible is an acronym known in Hebrew as the *Tanakh*, which is an acronym for its three parts: *Torah* (Five Books of Moses), *N'vi-im* (Prophetic Works), and *K'tuvim* (Writings). We also have *Midrash*, which are rabbinic interpretations of the biblical writings. In addition to this, we have the *Mishnah*, which is the first written collection

of Jewish law. Years later, our sages added the *Gemarah*—the commentaries on the Mishnah—and produced the *Talmud*, which has become the basis for studying Jewish practice. Add to this the countless generations of commentaries, legal codes, responsa (questions-and-answers), and liturgical compositions... Indeed, we are not a people who lack for something to read and study!

In this edition of Chai Lites, you will find a myriad of ways to celebrate the concept of *Talmud Torah: The Study of Torah (and other Jewish Texts)*. From our newly designed Junior Chai School and Chai School teen programs, to rejoicing with our youngest religious school students and celebrating the annual Torah reading cycle at Simchat Torah services, to engaging in adult education programs such as our weekly rabbi-led Torah Study sessions and other wonderful classes offered at Temple Chai, to participating in our Levinson Scholar-in-Residence Weekend with Rabbi Amy Scheinerman... we invite you and encourage you to join us in these and other expressions of *Talmud Torah*.

There is a midrash I appreciate which attempts to explain why we place the blessing *Sim Shalom* at the end of the *Amidah*, which inspires this greeting as well. Rabbi Shimon ben Chalifta, writing about the Torah Portion Pinchas in *Genesis Rabbah*, a book of Rabbinic stories and text interpretation on the book of Genesis,

from the 4–5th centuries CE said “*Ein keli machazik berachah elah shalom*” or “*There is no vessel better than peace for containing blessing.*” And so, we bless each other with Shalom – to be in a place of peace from which to accept, appreciate and experience God's blessings. Intruducing Online Adult Learning



At Temple Chai we strive for excellence! Last year we celebrated our school becoming accredited by the Association of Reform Jewish Educators. This year, we strive for excellence for our adult learners too! We know we offer wonderful programs for adults, such as Third Thursdays, Mini-mesters, Down Town Lunch and Learns and an inspirational Levinson Scholar in Residence, this year with Rabbi Amy Scheinerman November 8th–10th. But we are always looking for something new.

I'm thrilled to share that we have become a Melton partner! The Florence Melton School of Jewish Learning is the largest pluralistic adult Jewish education network in the world. Founded in 1980 at the initiative

of Florence Zacks Melton, with curriculum developed by the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, there are now 50 Melton Schools throughout the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, South Africa and New Zealand, attended weekly by 4,000 students.

But Temple Chai is still on the cutting edge, because for the first time, we'll be offering our class via Zoom!

Zoom is an online platform for group discussions and learning. Starting **Wednesday, November 6th you can join Rabbi Baden from 8:30–9:30 P.M. online for the Foundations of Jewish Living**, a curriculum designed for parents, through a platform that makes learning accessible for parents! You can log in from your phone or computer, after the kids have done their homework or even gone to bed! This 5-week course is an opportunity for parents to engage in the core values of Judaism. In spite of the divisive and erratic times we live in, we have every reason to believe that the younger generation will step up to the plate and play significant roles in healing our society. Two of those budding leaders are right here at Temple Chai.

Evie Katz, 17 and Lindsay Semmelman, 16 are committed to making the world a better place. Both are studying leadership through the Diller Teen Fellows Program, an immersive one-year course of study that teaches leadership, *tikkun olam* (repairing the world), building a connection to the Jewish people and Israel, and deepening one's Jewish identity.

They were both chosen through an application process, along with recommendations from teachers at Buffalo Grove High School and Temple Chai. To be considered, students must demonstrate leadership aptitude, commitment to Jewish learning, service to the community and interest in Israel. Funding comes from the Jewish Federation, the Crown Family and other donors.

Diller teens explore and expand their understanding of who they are, who they want to be, and how they want to make a mark on the world. The program teaches teens how to empower the future of the Jewish people.

Evie, a senior at Buffalo Grove HS, just completed the training, which included monthly workshops, classes and programs. The training culminated with a trip to Israel this summer with hundreds of teens from around the world. Evie said that she met other kids who lived much different lives than she. "I learned how to become an active listener, to listen to other people's points of view, while at the same time respectfully standing up for my own. It taught me so much and helped me become closer to those who had a differing opinion. We became a family."

Lindsay, a junior at BGHS is just starting the program. "I'm excited for the upcoming year to learn how to be a stronger leader in the Jewish community," she said.

"I am hoping Diller will help me impact other's lives. One of the things I am very passionate about is mental health. I want to help eliminate the stigma around it."

Both young women hope that the lessons learned through Diller will carry them on to college and beyond.

Temple Chai has the best group of congregants in the Northwest Suburbs. We just introduced you to two future leaders you can be proud of.

It's a special moment seeing a student learn their first Hebrew letters and Torah stories, and a highlight of my day is watching our teachers connect with the kids through text and history. But it was my time in the temple youth choir that taught me how to make liturgy, Torah, and prayer accessible and the choir is still that fantastic avenue to help even the youngest of our community begin their Jewish journey.

Every September/October as we approach the High Holy Days, I think back to my time in youth choir. I am not what you would call a "good singer" as my daughter often reminds me while we sing Disney together. However, I believe my time in

Spice of Chai

Sukkot | Beginning just four days after Yom Kippur, Sukkot coincides with the harvest when workers in Biblical times would live in temporary huts in the fields. It also commemorates the 40 years the Israelites lived in temporary shelters while wandering in the desert. Sukkot is a joyous eight-day celebration when we build and eat (and sleep!) in temporary outdoor structures, decorated with fresh fruit, gourds and other decorations hung from roofs of branches open to the stars. Fall foods such as pumpkin and squash are served along with cabbage, grape leaves, peppers and other stuffed vegetables symbolic of a “full” harvest.



STUFFED TOMATOES WITH PARMESAN CHEESE

4 Lg. tomatoes
1 ½ c. seasoned stuffing (Pepperidge farm)
1 T. margarine
2 to 3 T. water (enough to hold stuffing together)
¼ c. celery chopped fine
Parsley flakes
Grated Parmesan cheese (fresh preferred)

Cut tomatoes in half. Carefully cut out stem portion. Remove some of the tomato pulp so it will be able to hold the stuffing. For stuffing, melt margarine with the water and celery. Add stuffing and enough water to hold the stuffing together. Mix with a fork. Stuff the tomatoes – make sure the stuffing peaks over the tomatoes. Sprinkle with the Parmesan cheese and parsley flakes. Spray Pam in a Corning Ware baking dish. Arrange tomatoes in pan, stuffing side up. Cover with foil to prevent burning. Bake at 325 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes. Remove foil. Bake for another 1 to 2 minutes so cheese can brown. Serves 8.



UN-STUFFED CABBAGE

Written by Linda Brubaker

1 head cabbage
1 lb. ground meat
1 sm. Onion, chopped
1 c. raw rice
2 T. fresh parsley, chopped (or dry)
Salt & Pepper
Garlic Powder
1 can tomato sauce + 1 can water
Lemon juice
Brown Sugar

Slice cabbage. Lay half into bottom of roasting pan. Make meat balls from meat, onion, rice, parsley and seasonings. Place onto cabbage. Cover with remaining cabbage. Combine sauce ingredients. Pour sauce over cabbage. Bake at 350 degrees for 1.5 hours. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Simchat Torah

Falling the day after Sukkot, Simchat Torah — Rejoicing with the Torah — celebrates with humor, joy and song the completion and immediate beginning again of the yearly cycle of reading the Torah, Jewish written law. Children are given honey so they “taste” the sweetness of the Torah. An Ashkenazic tradition is eating kreplach (aka Jewish wonton), dough stuffed with meat filling then boiled and served in chicken soup or fried and served as a side dish.

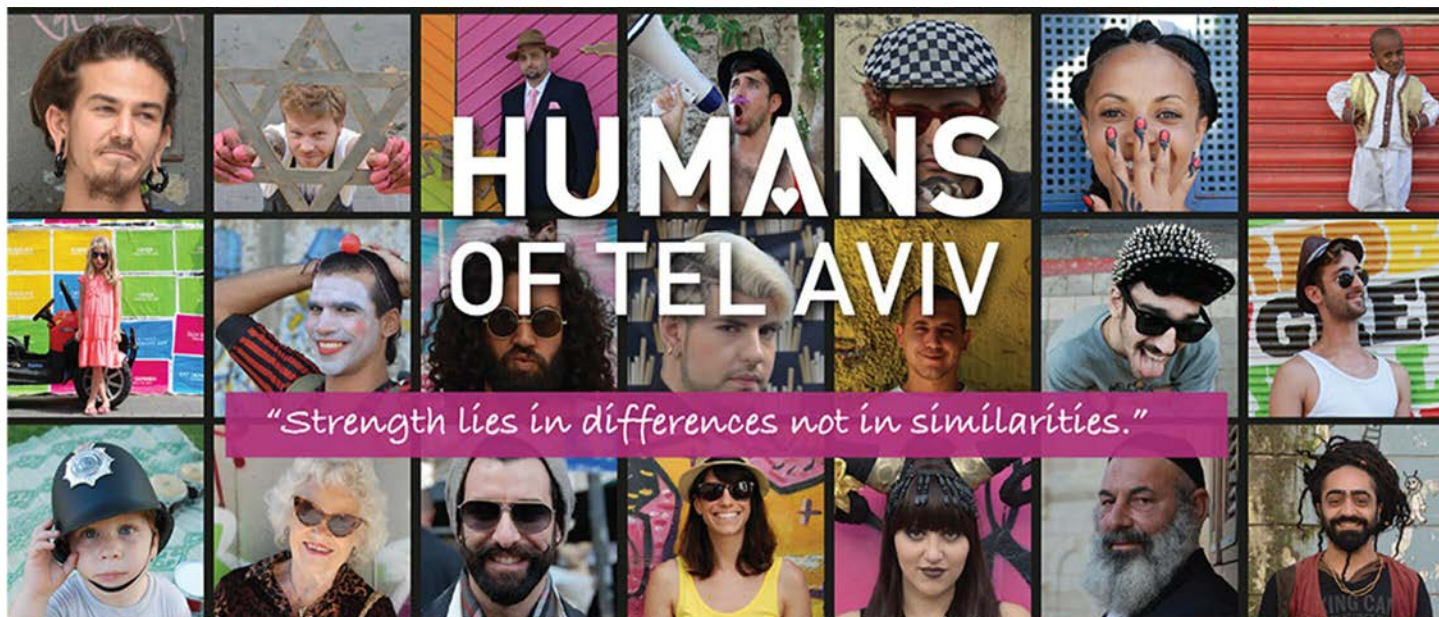

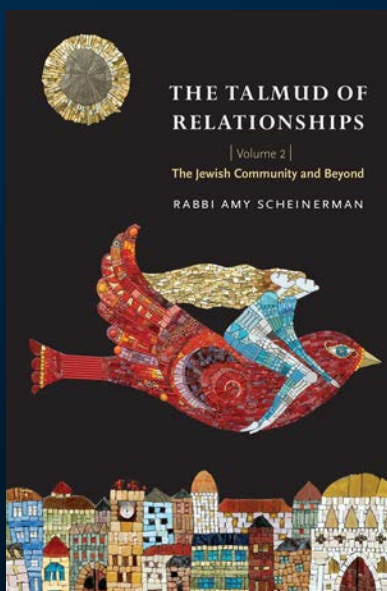
