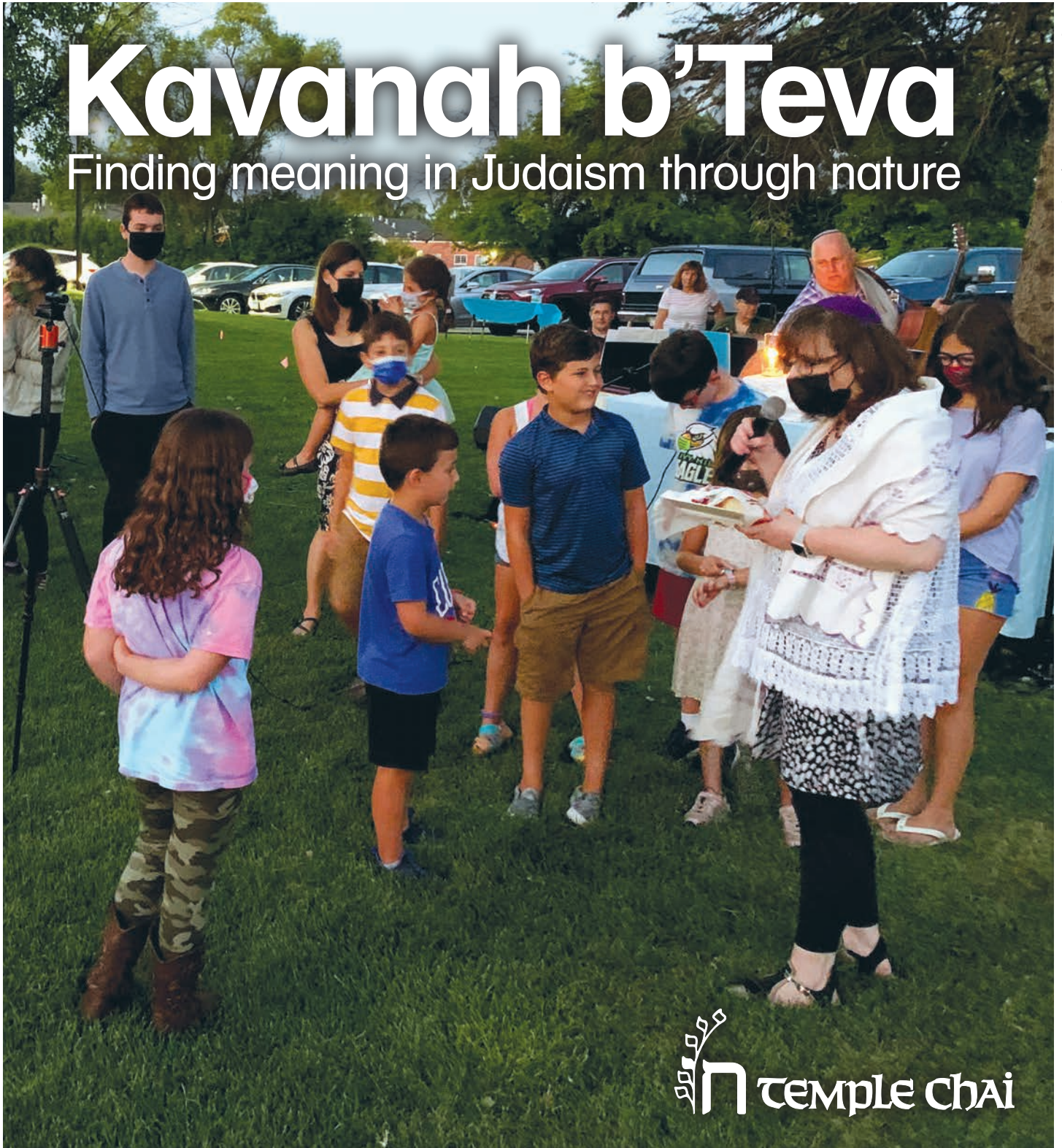

The Great Outdoors



Rabbi Nachman of Breslov used to pray: O God, grant me the ability to be alone. May it be my custom to go outdoors each day among the trees and grass—among all growing things—and there may I be alone to enter into prayer, to talk with the

One to whom I belong. May I express there everything in my heart, and may all the foliage of the field—all grasses, trees, and plants—awake at my coming, to send the powers of their life into the words of my prayer, so that my prayer and speech are made whole through the life and spirit of all growing things, which are made as one by their transcendent Source. May I then pour out the words of my heart before Your presence like water, O God, and lift up my hands to You in worship, on my behalf, and that of my children!

This prayer encapsulates the spirit of what being in nature can mean to us. Especially now, in the age of Amazon.com, Instacart, Doordash, and Netflix—all of which makes it easy to stay nestled in our indoor cocoons—it is important for us to remind ourselves how powerful it can be to spend time outdoors in the natural world. To breathe in fresh air; to soak in the scents of the leaves, flowers, and grass; to bask in the sunlight; to feel the breeze; to hear the

birds—the experience of being outside can awaken our senses and help us appreciate the beauty of God’s creation.

Today, being outside takes on even greater significance. As we make our way to the other side of the pandemic, many of us are so much more comfortable interacting with others outdoors where ventilation is free-flowing. After being shut in these past two years, we are grateful for the opportunity to gather together in the fresh air so that we can breathe together a bit more easily.

As we enjoy these summer months, may we take advantage of the warmer weather and push ourselves to venture out into nature—whether it is a walk around our neighborhood by ourselves or with loved ones, a bike ride on a trail, a visit to the lake, or a Friday night in our outdoor Shabbat worship space—may we each find time to enjoy the outdoors so that we can connect with each other and with the spirit of the divine.

Two years ago, to combat feeling cooped up, many members of our congregation began a walking routine that they've kept up with. Hearing their accomplishments has been inspiring; as has hearing the benefits gained as they've gone from counting steps to counting miles, to preparing for marathons. I've also enjoyed the awe-inspiring photos of wildlife, mountain, sea and sky that many have shared from their treks and travels.

I get outdoors when possible as part of my daily prayer practice. Whether doing "walking meditation" and expressing

blessings of gratitude to nature on my own treks or while 'sitting' outside, I try to engage spirit. If I'm feeling a lot of creative energy, I channel the beauty that I'm experiencing into something tangible that I can use again. I recommend this to anyone who enjoys writing poetry or songs to refill their spiritual "well." I'll sit in nature with my guitar — and my recorder and write a psalm, blessing, prayer or song. This creative work engages a different state of awareness than meditative practice, but when surrounded by nature, I still feel that rush of transcendence and "Source" connectedness. There is a world of Jewish options for this type of prayer practice. I recommend our 2015 scholar in residence Rabbi Mike Comins' books, including *Making Prayer Real* and *A Wild Faith* as great resources to start with. Many of you have seen my "Shmuli" videos, on our Facebook page and my YouTube channel, in which I poke fun at my outdoor meditation practice (search 'Shhhhhhhhhmuli Shabbat Shtick' to find it on YouTube). In it, I'm dressed like a guru singing quietly "don't wake the birds,

don't wake the birds, they don't need to hear you scream and shout. Don't wake the birds, don't wake the birds, they have got enough to worry about." It's whacky fun about us human's making an "unaware" racket while getting back to nature. Silliness aside, nature indeed affords many curative soul benefits by effectively releasing our very human pent-up longing for connectedness to the earth and heavens.

Perhaps this summer you might want to explore the Jewish practice of spontaneous prayer and meditation while being secluded in nature called *Hitbodedut*. Of course there's our Shabbat Under the Stars and Summer Sabbath Services, but for some additional ideas I recommend: *A Wild Faith: Jewish Ways into the Wilderness*, *Wilderness Ways into Judaism* by Rabbi Mike Comins and visiting his website: <http://Rabbimikecomins.com>

YOM HA'ATZMAUT/ISRAEL INDEPENDENCE DAY

Wednesday, May 4 - Thursday, May 5, 2022

Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom HaAtzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967).

Yom HaAtzmaut marks the anniversary of the establishment of the modern state of Israel. It is observed on or near the 5th of the Hebrew month of Iyar on the Jewish calendar, which usually falls in April or early May. This year, Israel is commemorating its 74th year of independence.

Finding Connection In Teva



I woke up with the sun rising over the water. I had sand in my hair and while I felt dirty from not showering for a week, but also felt refreshed from a good night's sleep. We had been hiking across the Negev desert and that night camped under the stars on the shores of the Red Sea. Over the water we could see Egypt, Jordan, and Saudi Arabia in the distance. Firmly on Israeli soil, we were going to bus back to Jerusalem in time for Shabbat. I was 16 years old and was spending the semester in Israel as part of EIE (now Heller High) a program of the URJ. In addition to our regular high school classes, we also took Hebrew and Jewish History classes, we spent a week in *Gadna* and Israeli high school pre-Army training, a week at Kibbutz Lotan a Reform Kibbutz, a week hiking across the north of the country, and we were just finishing a week hiking in the very southern part of the Negev desert.

It was life changing to say the least.

Judaism and the outdoors go hand in hand for me. I've spent most summers of my life as a camper, counselor or now faculty member at Olin Sang Ruby Union Institute (OSRUI) the URJ camp in Oconomowoc, WI. I was also fortunate to spend two summers traveling to Jewish camps across South Africa, experiencing Jewish life in the outdoors in a whole new way. But truly, nothing compares to spending time in the Israeli *teva* (nature).

During my first year of Graduate School studying at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, I lived in Israel and participated in a 5-day bike ride to raise funds and awareness for Progressive Judaism. We biked from Jerusalem down to the Dead Sea and then up to Haifa. It was hard, and exhausting, but also a completely different way to experience Israel. There is something so special about biking through small town roads, smelling different crops as you pass through fields and feeling the air change from the lowest point on earth as you climb up a mountain toward the next city. It sounds cliché, but to truly appreciate it, you must experience it for yourself!

I'm SO excited to be spending 2 weeks this summer at OSRUI with so many of our Temple Chai students! I can't wait to pray in our *Beit T'fillah* (prayer space) outside, to

hear the birds while we sing the *Sh'ma*. But also, to be so proud of them as they climb Etgar the 5 story Alpine tower or to help them navigate as they make new friendships and to celebrate Shabbat with them outside at camp. All of which are truly Jewish experiences in *teva* (nature).

There is also a Temple Chai trip to Israel at this same time next year, in June 2023. I can't promise there will be an epic bike ride, but I can promise life changing experiences that can only happen in Israel! Come see it for yourself!!

Nature and Jews

When my volunteer position at the Chicago Botanic Garden Butterfly exhibit has me greeting guests prior to entrance into the enclosure, I ask a young person “What are you going to do if a butterfly lands on you?” I get a quizzical look from the child and the mom before I answer “Smile, because the butterfly makes you happy.” What kind of a world would it be without butterflies and nature? Imagine!

The preservation of nature is very important in the Jewish faith. Spring is the time of rebirth. Flowers emerge and start to show their colors, leaves bud on trees, fruits and vegetables are planted, to be harvested in the summer and fall during Sukkot. Animals come out from their burrows, trees become alive with birds and squirrels, hibernation ends with longer days of sunshine (hopefully) and insects of all types are active, giving life to the food chain on all levels.

Surviving in the Desert

Wandering in the desert has been an important part of Jewish history. Whether it was the Negev where Moses and the Israelites wandered for 40 years, or the Judean Desert where Jews rebelled against the Romans on the top of Masada, the desert has been a significant environment in which Jews and Israelis learned to survive.

Fast forward to the current State of Israel. The desert environment comprises about 60% of Israel's land. Young combat soldiers serving in the IDF need to be prepared to work in extreme conditions. They spend time training in the heat of the Negev. The soldiers conclude their desert training with a long march, or "masa" in Hebrew. During their desert training, they receive special packaged rations that become a meal when mixed with water. Where do they get water in the desert? The IDF has a special unit of water engineers that is dedicated to providing water for soldiers in the field using reverse osmosis.

Through both ancient and modern times, the knowledge to survive in the desert has been critical. As Sabras, they learned from the desert plant to be tough on the outside and sweet in the inside.

Teva Tea

Looking for something new to do? Start your own vegetable and herb garden! There are lots of fun foods and plants that you can grow in your backyard or in planters, and it's fun to experiment with them in new recipes.

Enjoy this recipe for Teva Tea originally made at OSRUI.

- 1 cups of water
- 4 mint leaves (Spearmint and/or Apple mint)
- 1 tablespoons of torn chamomile leaves and stems (or 1 teaspoon of dried chamomile tea)
- 1 stem of lemon grass, optional
- ½ tablespoon of honey (adjust to taste)

1. In a cup of water add all herb leaves/stems.
2. Place in the microwave for 50 seconds, or until the water turns green/yellow.
(Or boil on the stove.)
3. Add honey and stir.
4. Serve warm or with ice, and enjoy!

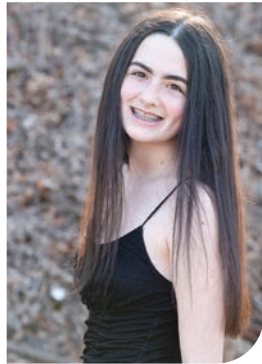

Spice of Chai

“Why do we eat dairy on Shavuot?”

The origin of this custom is unknown. It stands in contrast to the traditions surrounding other Jewish holidays, which often call for eating meat. Since it was often more expensive than other foods, meat was reserved for celebratory events. Rabbinic tradition has suggested a number of reasons for this custom. Chapter 4, verse 11 of The Songs of Songs compares Torah to honey and milk. As a result of this lovely comparison, it is typical on Shavuot to eat blintzes, cheesecake, and noodle kugels.”

CHEDDAR QUICHE

- 1 deep-dish frozen pie shell, baked
- 1 med. Onion, chopped & sauteed
- ¼ c. butter, melted, at room temperature
- 3 eggs
- 1 (6 oz.) can evaporated milk
- ½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- ¼ tsp. Tabasco sauce
- 1 c. shredded Cheddar cheese
- ¼ c. sliced mushrooms sauteed (optional)

Foil edges of shell. Add shredded cheese, mushroom slices (optional), and onion to pie shell. Mix remainder of ingredients together and pour into shell. Place onto cookie sheet to prevent spills. Bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes, then lower oven temperature to 325 degrees and bake an additional 25 minutes.

- 12 slices of white bread
- 9 eggs, well beaten (can use Egg Beaters)
- 3 c. milk
- 1 ½ T. oil (canola)
- 1 T. onion flakes
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 1 c. grated sharp Cheddar cheese (can use Mozzarella cheese)

Trim crust off bread; cut bread into cubes. Combine eggs, milk, oil, and seasonings. Blend in cheese. In an ungreased 2-quart souffle dish, alternate cubes and egg mixture. Refrigerate overnight, bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 10 minutes, or until puffed and brown. Cannot freeze.

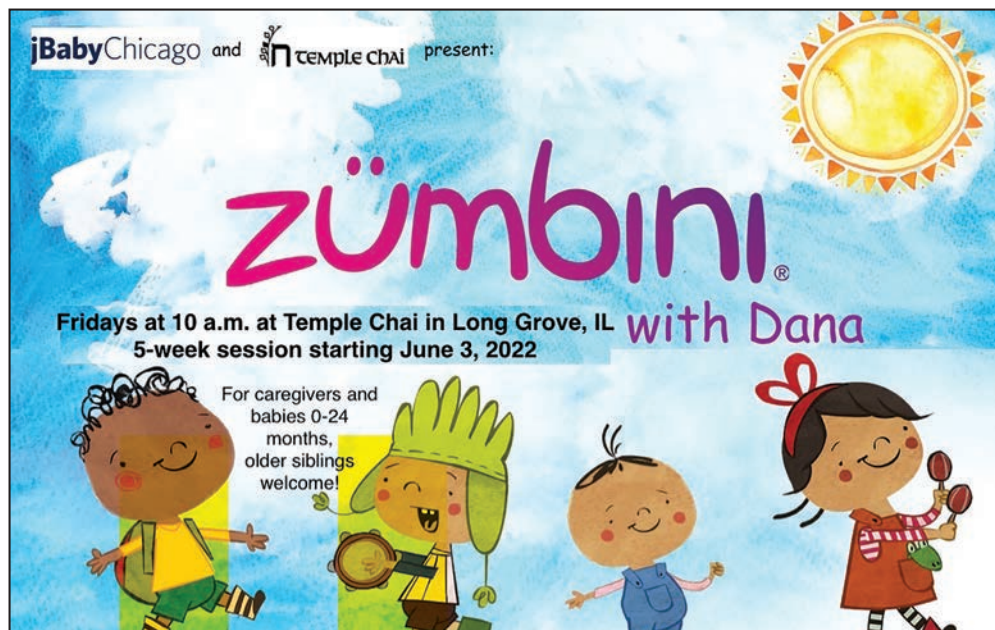
