Yovel — a Year of Jubilee



Words, and numbers for that matter, can have a lot of symbolism in Jewish tradition: 7 days of the week, 7 weeks of the Omer, (the weeks between Passover and Shavuot), 7 years of Shmita or agricultural Sabbatical year. In biblical and modern times alike, crops are not harvested during the Shmita year in Israel to give the land a restorative break. The 7 cycles of Shmita (or entering the 50th year) is referred to as the Jubilee year or Yovel in Hebrew.

"The word Yovel is also a matter of some dispute. Its Hebrew root — yud, bet, lamed — is phonetically similar to the modern English word jubilee. Many authorities -Rashi chief among them — believe the word refers to the blowing of shofar, since it shares a root with the biblical word for ram, the horns of which are used for shofars. But others — Maimonides perhaps most famously — believe the word means something like "to bring" or "to convey," a reference to the return of land to its original owners. Still others believe the word means something akin to "mixture" — it is also similar to the Hebrew word for flood, mabul, in which all is mixed up. In this reading, the Yovel year is one in which private and public property become intermingled." (https://www.myjewishlearning.com/article/sabbatical-year-shemitah-and-jubilee-year-yovel/)

I love this breakdown of the Yovel year, because the significance means something different to each scholar and yet is related. As we begin to celebrate our Temple Chai's 50th year, we will have elements of all these translations!! There will be loud and proud public declarations – like that of blowing the shofar. There will be opportunities to celebrate our founders and those whose visions continue to sustain us. And finally, we will be mixed up; we will have opportunities to gather as families that when intermingled together, become our special Temple Chai community!

Our Jewish text also reminds us that we need to care for one another, just as we care for the earth. We need to pause and reset. To give space to grow (and to learn) and refresh ourselves. I am truly inspired as we embark on this exceptional milestone over the course of the next year! I cannot wait to celebrate both the past meaningful 50 years and the vibrant, future 50 years to come!





Celebrating 50 years of Sisterhood

When Temple Chai began in 1972, men and women worked together on all programs and fundraisers. As the years progressed, women realized we would prefer working together in a women's group. During a summer gathering at the home of Beverly Schreiber, the ladies decided that we would plan activities that were independent of the male members and appealed to women.

At the beginning, this women's group supported Temple Chai by hosting the Shabbat Onegs, having picnics, and sponsoring a daytime bowling league. In 1978, Temple Chai Sisterhood received a charter from the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS, now called Women of Reform Judaism). In the first three months we raised \$3000 to be donated to the Temple. Early projects included garage sales, lox boxes, Chanukah bazaars and a gift shop where items were sold out of the trunk of our cars! We were able to continue our fundraising projects, and donate funds to build and stock a kitchen for our new building in Long Grove. Besides fundraising, education and social justice, our children became a priority. We sponsored various programs to support our schools.

Many Sisterhood women have gone on to hold positions on the WRJ (NFTS) Midwest District Board (which soon will be called Heartland District) including holding the position of President as well as serving on WRJ. To so many of us Temple Chai and the sisterhood became our home. Our success was greatly due to the dedication and support of the women of Temple Chai. And even though names have changed- NFTS to WRJ (Women of Reform Judaism), and the Temple Chai Sisterhood to Women of Temple Chai (WTC), the women of our beloved Temple Chai continue this 50 year legacy through social activities, education, Tikkun Olam, spirituality, and fundraising.


Temple Chai's 50th and Planning for the Israel Trip




This upcoming trip will be unique compared to the last six trips, as it will be taking place during summer instead of during winter. A summer trip will allow travelers to experience different outdoor places and activities. For example, two of Israel's national parks, which I visited many years ago, are well-suited for a summer trip. The first, Hermon Stream (Banias) Nature Reserve, contains Israel's largest waterfall. I remember the smell of the forest reminded me of a florist shop. The second, Gan HaShlosha (Sachne) has warm spring-fed pools. This experience included swimming in the water with small fish. Another

beautiful place to walk around is the Baha'i Gardens in Haifa. Since the gardens are on a steep hill, it is optimal to visit in dry weather. Lake Kinneret (Sea of Galilee) provides opportunities for water sports or a boat ride. Located along the eastern shore of Lake Kinneret is Kibbutz Ein Gev. This kibbutz is known not only for its beautiful beaches but also for its fish restaurant which serves fresh fish from the lake. Perhaps these places will be on the 2023 itinerary.

Temple Chai – Our First Fifty Years



What follows in Part 1 are excerpt or a summary of what appears in full in Our First Forty years - Temple Chai - 1973 to 2013, a book that was published in 2013 and that is available at the temple. The facts presented in Part 1 are the result of meticulous research by temple members Richard and Barbara Heinrich. Richard wrote the full version of Part 1 for the book.

Looking Back

In the fall of 1971, five couples, including Richard and Barbara Heinrich, discussed forming a Reform Congregation in the Buffalo Grove-Arlington Heights area. They believed that there would be sufficient interest to support a Reform congregation. The five grew to twenty-five by the spring of 1972. The first executive committee selected the name - Temple Chai (Temple of Life in Hebrew) for the temple's name.







Temple's First Torah & Rabbi

Temple Chai applied to the Westminster Trust and was awarded it's first Torah, the Holocaust Scroll from the Pinkas Synagogue in Prague on permanent loan. On February 18, 1972, Temple Chai held its first Shabbat service in the gym of Kilmer School in Buffalo Grove. There were about 150 in attendance and the new Torah scroll was used by Temple Chai for the first time. Rabbi Haskell Bernat led the service and he then alternated once a month along with other Chicago area Reform rabbis until the community was able to obtain its own rabbi. During May 1972, the temple leadership was in touch with the Cincinnati Campus of the Hebrew Union College/Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC/JIR) to obtain the services of a part-time rabbinical student to serve the temple on a bi-weekly basis.

On June 12, 1972, the temple was informed that Lane Steinger, a fifth-year rabbinic student, would be the first spiritual leader and would begin during August. Rabbi Steinger served Temple Chai during its first year, 1972-1973, and conducted the first High Holy Day services and all the life cycle events. As well as worked with the school committee on both the religious school and Hebrew school curriculum. By the end of 1972, after Temple Chai's first High Holy Day services, the congregation had grown to about 70 families with over 100 children in the school.

On December 11, 1972, the board formed a rabbinic search committee and the temple's first rabbinic search began with an application to the UAHC/CCAR Placement Commission. Rabbi Floyd Herman was proposed by the committee to be Temple Chai's first permanent rabbi. At its April meeting, the board approved the hiring, and he was confirmed at the annual meeting on May 3, 1973. When Rabbi Herman was hired, there were about 100 families.

Temple Chai's First Baby Naming

On September 21, 1973, during Shabbat services at Chamber Park, Rabbi Herman conducted his first baby naming at Temple Chai naming Shari, the daughter of Barb and Rich Heinrich, who had arrived on May 30,1973. Shari went on to become the first congregant of Temple Chai to become a rabbi and was ordained in May 2000, at the HUC/JIR Cincinnati campus.

The Temple's first Torah, a Holocaust scroll from the Pinkas Synagogue, is still one of the Torah scrolls in our Aron Kodesh (Ark) today.



Temple Chai's First Permanent Worship Space

In January, 1974, Temple Chai moved to its first regular worship home at Kingswood Methodist Church and also moved the office from the rabbi's house to the church. Prior to moving to Kingswood, the rabbi and temple members would carry the Torah and prayer books in their cars to the locations of services. The move to Kingswood gave the congregation a sense of permanence and belonging.

Milestones for Youth at Temple Chai

During May, 1974, Temple Chai experienced several significant occasions. At Shabbat Services on May 10, the first bar mitzvah was celebrated. On May 19, the board adopted a by- law creating the first temple school board. Since its beginning, Temple Chai has been blessed with an active supportive congregation in regards to education and the religious school. From the temple's inception, educating both children and adults has been a high priority.

Moving To 1670 Checker Road

After the 1974 High Holy Days, the board saw the need to begin planning for a permanent location for the congregation. The Land Acquisition Committee found two possible locations. The amount of acreage that was needed had been revised upward to between four and five acres. One location was in Lake County Strathmore, Buffalo Grove, and the other was in unincorporated Long Grove. On February 9, 1976, the board approved the committee's recommendation that the temple purchase the land at Acadia Farm in Long Grove. In September 1979, the membership came together for the groundbreaking of the building. The ceremony was led by Rabbi Herman, Eli Berkman and lay leadership. Major construction of the building was finished in August 1980. Temple Chai celebrated with a weekend that included a black-tie optional ball held in the sanctuary/social hall. The sanctuary/social hall didn't look anything like the original plans since there wasn't money left in the budget to finish the bimah area, cover the cinder block walls with drywall or paneling, or carpet the social hall floor. However, temple had its own space that could accommodate over 1100 individuals for High Holy Day services and other events.

ChaiLites

At the beginning of its first official year, the first newsletter, the *Chai-Lites*, was sent to each family. The *Chai-Lites* has been published ever since and is currently in both hard copy and online.

Early Leadership at Temple Chai

Because of Temple Chai's rapid growth, the board in the Spring of 1977 authorized the hiring of the temple's first professional educator, Eli Berkman. Under Eli's direction, both the religious school and Hebrew school programs were strengthened.

Temple Chai continued its growth after moving into its permanent home and began a maturation process. Rabbi Herman left the congregation in June 1981, for a new opportunity at an older and much larger Reform congregation in Baltimore, Maryland. A search for a new rabbi began. Due to the timing of the move, Temple Chai had an interim rabbi, Rabbi Alan Secher. He served for a year before Rabbi Fred Reiner joined Temple Chai in July 1982. Rabbi Reiner served as the temple's spiritual leader for two years before leaving for a pulpit in Washington, DC. Rabbi Harold Caminker succeeded Rabbi Reiner in July 1984.

In the late spring of 1992, Rabbi Caminker informed the board that he had accepted a position with another congregation and would be leaving Temple Chai at the end of June 1992. Since there wasn't enough time to conduct a thorough rabbinic search, the board decided to bring in interim rabbis for the 1992-1993 year and to conduct an intensive search to find the right rabbi for Temple Chai. Rabbi David Saperstein, the Director of the UAHC Religious Action Center was the temple's High Holy Day rabbi. Rabbi Alan Secher and Rabbi Steven Denker served as the interim rabbis during the 1992-1993 year. Since the temple's rabbi was also the teacher for the confirmation class, the temple hired Jerry Kaye, the director of the UAHC Olin Sang Ruby Union Institute Camp, as the confirmation program educator. He worked with the interim rabbis and the temple's educational director.

Welcoming Rabbi Hart

In April 1993, Rabbi Stephen Hart was selected to be the next rabbi of Temple Chai. Rabbi Hart came to Temple Chai after being the associate rabbi of North Shore Congregation Israel in Glencoe, for eight years. He had been one of Temple Chai's song leaders in the late seventies before going to the Hebrew Union College/Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. Rabbi Hart made an immediate impact on Temple Chai, especially in the areas of youth programming, outreach, and membership.

Welcoming Dr. Jeff Kondritzer as the Director of Education

Dr. K came to Temple Chai after having served as the education director for Temple Emanuel in Chicago for many years. Dr. K remained with the temple for seventeen years, retiring in June 2011. He is still an integral part of the Temple Chai community. He helped to grow Temple Chai's education programs as well as his famous portrayal of Rabbi Soul.

Temple Chai at 25 years

In October 1996, as part of the congregation's 25thyear celebration, the board authorized the writing of a "Sefer Torah". The two Torahs that were being used were the Holocaust Memorial Scroll acquired in 1972 and the Torah bought from Temple Judea. They were both heavily used due to the number of services and b'nei mitzvah and numerous other life cycle events. The writing of the Sefer Torah kicked off Temple Chai's 25th anniversary celebration. The culmination weekend occurred with the Torah dedication at Shabbat Services on December 19, 1997, when the last letters were inscribed by the sofer. The Torah scroll was unrolled and held by congregants for all to see. The 25thyear celebration also included a special calendar that was given to all members. On October 20, 1996, the temple held a dinner honoring Rabbi Hart for his ten years in the rabbinate. During the celebratory year, the Temple Chai Players presented the play Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat with Rabbi Hart playing the role of Joseph.





Welcoming Cantor Simon

Cantor Scott Simon joined Temple Chai's clergy team in July 1999, replacing cantorial soloist Ian Geller. Cantor Simon came to temple from Temple Beth Israel in Skokie with his wife Gail and their three children. Cantor Simon recently celebrated his 20th year at Temple Chai in 2019 and continues to inspire the congregation with his dedication, leadership, and of course, his amazing Purim spiels.

The Creation of the Temple Chai Israel Trip

In his 2009 High Holy Day message, Rabbi Hart introduced the custom of developing a study theme for the entire year. The topic for the 2009-2010 year was "This I Believe". The theme was incorporated in sermons and Lifelong Jewish Learning. In December 2009, Steve and Maxine Sukenik along with Rabbi Hart and his wife Mendy led a trip to Israel. The Israel trip has now become a biennial event and has included the celebrations of b'nei mitzvah in Eretz Yisrael.

Welcoming Laura Perpinyal

Temple Chai's beloved educational director, Dr. Jeff Kondritzer, retired in June 2011, after serving Temple Chai for 17 years and welcomed Laura Siegel Perpinyal during the summer of 2011 as the Director of Congregational Learning. Laura graduated from HUC/ JIR Rhea Hirsch School of Education at the Los Angeles campus and has emphasized Temple Chai's approach of focusing on Jewish study for the entire temple community, not just the children. Laura continues to develop and grow Temple Chai's educational, youth, adult, and community programming. She recently celebrated ten years at Temple Chai this past year.

Welcoming Rabbi Baden

In 2015, Temple Chai brought in Rabbi Ilana Baden as the Senior Associate Rabbi. She previously served at Isaac M. Wise Temple in Cincinnati, Ohio and at Temple Beth-El of Battle Creek, Michigan before joining the Temple Chai community with her husband Jeff and two kids, Ellie and Zachary. In 2018, Rabbi Baden became Temple Chai's Senior Rabbi after the retirement of Rabbi Hart. Rabbi Baden has been instrumental in helping Temple Chai navigate the ever-changing landscape of Reform Judaism and strengthening our congregation.

This article is a very brief overview of an extremely vibrant and inspiring fifty years at Temple Chai. Thank you to all those who have worked to make Temple Chai the welcoming warm congregation that we all cherish. We look forward to praying, learning, and celebrating with you at Temple Chai during the next fifty years.
